Means and ends

- Provision of children's libraries starts with
 - respect for children's own voices and actions
 - ideal of children's right to be informed and express themselves
(the UN Convention of the Rights of the Child)
- Future provision of children's libraries ends with
 - responsibility of adults
 - Knowledge about children's socio-cultural practices
 - adult reflexivity of their own ideals
 - forms a basis for societal priorities and action



Children's leisure culture: some trends

- Children's leisure culture is largely a mediated culture
- Mediated culture is multimodal and global
- Mediated culture interlaces
 - reception and production
 - physical place and virtual space
- Children learn through informal media practices (info, emotions, comm.)
- Children can and must handle "othernesses"
- Children can and must handle complexities
 - Reading is supplemented, not



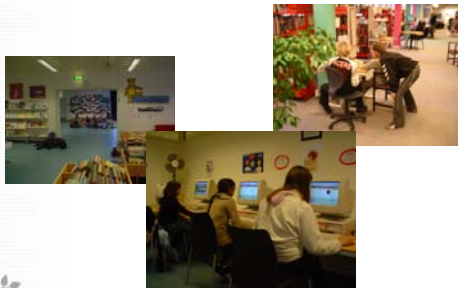
Implications for libraries in concrete terms

- Diversification of library uses
 - Physical library: more focus on traditional provision (concrete information)
 - Virtual library: more focus on innovative provision (emotional experiences (music), peer communication (chatting, blogging))
- Differentiation of user profiles
 - Young users: inclusive space

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Implications for libraries in wider terms: discursive challenges

- Literacy
 - Reading and writing as cultural and democratic goods
 - literature as cultural and communicative ideal
- Media literacy
 - [The national leadership conference on media literacy 1992](#)
 - The ability to access, analyze, evaluate and communicate messages in a variety of forms
 - emotional expressiveness and interaction as ideal
- Information literacy



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Future challenges

- User perspective:
Children need multimodal literacies in order to handle global complexities in a knowledge society
- Professional perspective:
Libraries need to integrate discursive traditions of culture, information, and expression



Libraries of the future

- Clarify and utilise differences between virtual and physical libraries
- Renew focus on developing the physical library
- Facilitate children's sustained multimodal competencies: from access and "being" to joint uses and sustained "doing"
 - Young coaches
 - The pervasive librarian
